I learned from her that silk is more than just a nice fabric. The quality varies from 100% to less when combined with cotton. I was shocked by the hues of some of the colors when she took me to her workshop.

"Do you always use silk?" I asked.

"There's so much you can do with it. A well-made silk dress will never go out of fashion," was her response.

I became convinced that Rhonda would hit the fashion magazines some day.

## Isabella López

Issi returned to Torrance with a different outlook of what her future could be. Being a well-known fashion model was still her main goal, though the road towards it seemed to have changed.

Beauty pageants may not be life-changing events or main activity events in the United States of America. Well, there have been exceptions, as when Halley Berry was first runner-up in the Miss World Pageant. Yes, Vanessa Williams who even after her dethronement, became a famous actress. I still think that these were exceptions.

In Latin America, beauty pageant contestants are assigned a level of notoriety that may last a lifetime. Cecilia Boloco, a Chilean Miss Universe in 1987, went on to become a CNN Español anchor. A Venezuelan Miss Universe, 1981 - Irene Sáez - was elected mayor of the district of Chacao in Caracas. Not all winners or runners-up remain in the fashion industry, though their participation in the contests makes a major difference to their future.

I thought of the whole thing as the US male equivalent of making it through sports. However, be it a worldwide sport or even something as frivolous as a beauty pageant, these are serious business enterprises with strict rules to be followed.

There is also the stigma attached to the participants -- jocks and beauty queens are regarded as all body and no brains. When they make money, the stereotyped image may be replaced by admiration. Making money brings in a whole new meaning.

For beauty queens, especially in the Donald Trump era -- he is the owner of the Miss Universe franchise -- crowns do not come without sacrifices. 1995 winner from Venezuela -- Alicia Machado -- was close to being stripped of her title for gaining weight.

Julia Morley, chairperson of the Miss World Pageant, has kept the organization's slogan -- beauty with a purpose, and the benefited charities, worldwide, show it. Trump's Miss Universe is a strong supporter of the fight against AIDS, and the winners become the face of Aid for AIDS.

Perhaps the best success story is that of Aishwara Rai, 1994 Miss World from India, who is Bollywood's greatest female star and is a successful businesswoman. On the social side, Wilnelia Merced, 1975 Miss World, from Puerto Rico, married UK TV personality, Sir Bruce Forsythe.

Full-time dedication is expected, once elected winner in any pageant. In 2002, Russia's Oxana Fedorova was dethroned as that year's Miss Universe shortly after for not complying with the scheduled activities. She was replaced by first runner-up Justine Pasek from Panama.

In some countries, one company or person may hold the franchise for the three main events: Miss Universe, Miss World, and Miss International. They are considered in the same descending order of importance. My belief is that the Miss World event seems to emphasize more qualities than just beauty.

There is an anecdote of a contestant in the preliminaries of a Latin American country who was asked who Confucius was. Her answer, which became an immediate internet joke, was, "He was a Chinese/Japanese man who invented the confusion." She was later labeled Miss Confusion and will be remembered for many years to come.

As Issi learned so much apparently useless trivia about national and international beauty pageants, she became aware of the responsibility that she had already started to carry on her shoulders. To make matters worse, participants from Paraguay had never made it past semi-finals.

### Mabelle and Sasha

Sasha had been Mabelle's favorite pupil from the beginning. In fact, the young single mother was her find in one of the modern dance classes she taught at El Camino College. The girl had such flexibility that she developed the idea of Gram Dance from watching her.

Initially, Sasha was not too convinced about migrating from modern dancing to something as foreign as sheet acrobatics. Her mentor showed her a video of Cirque du Soleil's Corteo. The challenge was accepted immediately.

Sheet dancing was not an approved course at the college, which made Mabelle decide to take advantage of her stockholder status at the gym and set it up as a private enterprise.

The gym was big enough, and its high ceiling was held by exposed, wide, iron beams. She chose the basketball court and installed two long sheets attached to pulleys facing each other. One was for Sasha; the other was for herself.

On the first training session, Sasha became familiar with her sheet. It was blue, with a deep hue. The material was soft and somewhat elastic. After a few seconds, she thought she was touching suede, though it probably was a combination of materials, perhaps synthetic, to provide holding power, smoothness and glide to the human body.

The first thing Sasha was taught, was to climb the sheet, first a few feet over the floor and slowly up to the top. Rather than following the technique for rope climbing by use of hand force, she learned to wrap the sheet around her hands or wrists to give the impression of gliding upwards. People commented that she was as agile as a cat climbing a curtain.

Gram Dance staged its first show with just two performers -- Mabelle and Sasha. It became a success at the college's theater. The choreographic theme was "just flying."

Four girls approached Mabelle a few days after the performance and asked to be trained by her. Since they were regular students in one of her classes, Mabelle added them to the ensemble. Sasha's sudden death almost obliterated her mentor's interest in Gram Dance. It had held several sold-out events and the girl was definitely the main attraction. Mabelle felt that she had lost a daughter, and she grieved accordingly.

Carl had a hard time making her continue with the group's projects. He knew his wife well enough and, eventually, was able to convince her to attend grief therapy. This helped her to reinstate the group's training.

She was not able, nevertheless, to replace Sasha's number with another girl. She flashed back to the image of the late dancer so often that it was painful. In her grief therapy group someone suggested she find a man to fill the spot.

"It doesn't sound like a bad idea," she almost never smiled, but she did this time.

Carl was very supportive with this alternative. The question was, "where do we find this person?"

"Something will work out, honey," Carl said, always convincingly. "It always does."

Both Carl and Mabelle were a very spiritual couple. Though they did not belong to any church in particular, they believed in the concept of some superior power that somehow took care of everyone. "Let's leave it up to Him," was their most frequent comment when facing tough times.

When I learned about their convictions, I thought that maybe one had participated in Alcoholics Anonymous, which embraces a similar belief. Later I found out that this was not the case.

I know that stating that "mens sana in corpore sano" - a healthy mind in a healthy body - may sound corny, but Carl and Mabelle were the best example.

Jack Russell had recently returned from Toronto, where he was allured by Cirque du Soleil. When he realized that a local group was going to do sheet acrobatics he made sure to audition. The following day he showed up at the gym and was granted his wish.

Mabelle was surprised by the speed with which he learned the basics. He lacked some flexibility, but she knew how this could be overcome.

"When I see him on the sheet, I no longer have flashbacks to Sasha," she admitted to her group therapy mates.

The group leader did warn her to watch out for a tendency to push the lad towards an imitation of the departed.

"It's going to be tough," Mabelle thought.

As time went by and Jack Russell was becoming more known within the gym, some comments about his video venture sneaked through Gram Dance's director. She decided not to let it turn into anything of actual importance.

Carl took the news on a lighter note when he told his wife, "It may be a bonus feature... after all he's a nice-looking chap."

#### Marcos

"Since I was in the Cuban equivalent of kindergarten," Marcos told me one day, "I have enjoyed dancing; so much that I was chosen to go into special training at an early age."

"That must have been fun," I commented.

"Not when you're taken to a special boarding school away from your family."

In just a short time, I learned that Marcos had been trained to become a ballet dancer. If he did as well as expected, he would have a privileged life for a Cuban youth. His personal goal was to dance under Alicia Alonso's direction. She was considered on par with Dame Margot Fonteyn, who died in Panama in 1991, where she is buried alongside her Panamanian husband.

On one occasion, he was chosen to be in a cultural exchange tour in Venezuela, where the group would perform for a few days. It did not take him long to be overawed by all the stores, freedom to purchase, freedom to travel within the country - his group was always under strict surveillance. He started dreaming of leaving his homeland.

His parents had departed Cuba during the 1980 Mariel mass migration to the U.S. He was at boarding school and was left behind. Nevertheless, they kept petitioning to have their son join them in Florida. Upon his return from Caracas, he started his own petition process. It took close to three years, and he was granted the special refugee visa and the Cuban government let him go.

His point of entry was Miami, where he was greeted by parents he hardly knew. They had set up a small restaurant where mostly Cuban fare was sold, and they were successful enough. Marcos worked at the restaurant for a while, but he missed dancing.

The youth was aware that starting a career in ballet was out of the question. But, after watching a morning exercise TV show, he decided to practice Latin dancing with the goal of becoming a gym dancing instructor. His ballet training gave him an edge.

He told me that since the 90s research had proven that dancing decreased stress and increased endorphin levels -- "happy feelings." He wanted to add burning calories. Salsa and merengue were great for that.

On his first day as a dance instructor, the manager found it strange that Marcos started with a routine of stretching rather than going straight to dancing. Ballet always began with this muscle warming sequence. The students -- mostly women -- found this to their liking and felt that it was easier for them to follow Marcos' steps. He became a success as a gym dancing instructor.

It did not take him long to decide to move to California, which captivated him with its aura of diversity. Once in Torrance he was hired by Mabelle's gym. He was convinced that he had to practice what he preached: whole fitness.

Marcos always arrived early, did his ballet warm-up, a bit of muscle toning with some machines, and drank a liter of water. By the time he finished warming up, his pupils had arrived and were ready to go. Everyone liked Marcos and did not mind that nothing was known about his private life.

### Catwalk and Flight

Marcos had designed a stage from which the models would move on to the catwalk. Almost simultaneously, Gram Dance would perform slow motions above. These would include ascending and descending on the hanging sheets or abgliding. The way I saw it in my mind, modeling was happening on the ground and in the enclosed sky.

The stage designer/choreographer had made sure that no group would eclipse the other. Therefore, when the Mistress of Ceremony announced the event, Gram Dance would follow the music while flying. As this ended, the name of the model was to be announced, followed by the description of her worn work of art, and the audience would be feasted through their eyes.

After each model's catwalk, Gram Dance would perform a different routine, and the same process was to be repeated until all the models --except Issi-- had delighted everyone with Rhonda's whole collection.

As is customary, the wedding dress is the last act. Marcos had a surprise up his sleeve.

The days for the fashion show approached, and the gatherings around Rhonda's snacks had taken a serious stance. It was almost a communion rather than just social snacking. It was pleasing to see both Carl and Mark dropping by quite often, supporting their spouses in a very proactive fashion. They both had lost any excess weight.

As far as Jack Russell was concerned, Mabelle had given him a special practice schedule, being an accomplice to Marcos' plans. Not even Issi was let in on the secret, and she wondered how he could be her escort when no hint had been given about his intervention. She trusted the organizers' judgment and decided not to worry about anything.

### Gloss and Silk

I was familiar with beauty contests as I had been a judge on several occasions in Panama, and Rhonda knew about it. Of course, my friend was open to any information that would help her with her fashion adventure.

One of Rhonda's main concerns was to keep the modeling rule: Nothing must distract attention from the dress. She had this in mind while looking for a make-up artist, something that I had forgotten all about.

The procedure was to ask the applicant what guidelines were followed to decide on a specific look for a model. Afterwards the portfolio was to be studied. This seemed to be fairly simple; nevertheless, it proved to be complicated.

I remembered that most interviews, catwalks and everything related to the beauty contestants was either televised live or captured on video for later release. The common denominator was brightness. The main goal was to bring out the best features in each woman. If the candidate had green eyes, the make-up artist would apply colors that would enhance them. It was a fact that green or blue eyes plus black hair was a proven asset

Apparently, the candidates for the particular job in the fashion show had the same vision of how a fashion model should be made-up. This was confirmed when Rhonda, Mabelle, Marcos and I started looking at the portfolio photos that each person had brought along. We had pretty much the same opinion -- good for a beauty contest but too much for a fashion show. In a way it made sense; this kind of event was a first in Torrance; these professionals had no previous experience in fashion modeling.

All interviewees followed the same guidelines I had observed in the Miss Panama Beauty Contests. No one mentioned that in modeling the most important feature had to be the dress, and the make-up had to be the equivalent of the frame on a beautiful picture. According to their concept of fashion modeling make-up, it was the other way around.

"I have the impression that these make-up artists want their work to be remembered," was the first comment Rhonda made when we decided that none of the persons interviewed lived up to our standards.

"I agree," I said.

"Rhonda," Mabelle commented, "The models are housewives, not professional models. Why don't we hire someone to teach them to apply the right kind of make-up, and have a hairdresser to prim their natural hairdos?"

Marcos almost jumped in saying, "I love the idea of reinforcing the fact that these are regular housewives doing an almost professional fashion show." And he added, "I have a friend who can do the job. She doesn't call herself a make-up artist, but I'll explain what we want, and I know she will be just right. She also does hairstyling."

"Well, after this let's write a 'how to do your own fashion show kit." Everyone laughed when they heard me.

### Showtime

Marcos' hairstylist friend lived up to our full expectations. She was able to convey to all the models that their make-up should be appropriate for an evening event while barely increasing the shade of their usual style. She also gave some advice about hairdos, and was on-hand just before each catwalk for any last-minute intervention.

I decided to rent a tuxedo. The occasion merited an upgrade of my attire. To my surprise, the models' spouses had the same idea.

The gym had a special entrance to the basketball court, which was transformed into a fashion show theatre. The spouses and I were assigned seats in the front row, left side. The show started when the Mistress of Ceremony welcomed the audience to "Silk and Flight," highlighting the participation of Gram Dance.

The program unfolded like clockwork. Prior to each model we watched an acrobat gliding, ascending and descending on the sheets, wearing an outfit whose color was a prelude of the following model. The M.C. announced the name of each model after the acrobat's routine. The music was appropriately paced and the volume was pleasant. The lights enhanced both the acrobats and the models.

By this time I had developed a friendly relationship with the other halves, and I must say that we made quite an impression with our new look -- well-fit and dressed to the nines. The group kept silent throughout the entire show -- in awe. The ladies were displaying Rhonda's silk creations over definitely non-plus size bodies.

I was very curious about Jack Russell's participation. In fact, only I knew that he would escort Issi. However, I had not seen him performing with Gram Dance and was wondering how he would make his appearance.

After Jenny did her catwalk showing a tight-fitting beige, bright, pure silk long dress the announcer said, "Our Isabella López will close tonight's fashion show wearing the wedding gown." A special beam of light shone on Issi and followed her as she walked. Halfway through her path another beam was directed above, where a sheet began to unfold while a male figure dressed in black started sliding. Jack Russell had been sitting, unnoticed, on the beam holding his sheet. Jack was wearing a very original imitation of a tuxedo designed by Rhonda. He was obviously timing his descent with Issi's approach to the end of the catwalk. When she arrived he slid to her side; the sheet

was immediately raised. They stood formally for a few seconds. Both smiled when everyone present burst in a standing ovation.

Issi's mauve bridal gown covered her perfect body. It paid homage to silk, her looks and the designer.

As is customary, the models reappeared with the designer glowing among them. In an unusual gesture, they were escorted by their spouses.

Torrance News reported on the fashion show, and an L.A. newspaper congratulated Rhonda, and her team for having not only sparkled with her designs but for having turned the whole process into a therapeutic goal-oriented event that initiated with sweat and ended with glamour.

Apparently, Jenny and her husband had been interviewed by the newspaper and they commented on Rhonda's transformation from plus size to normal. They emphasized that normal meant not overweight. The proud husband mentioned how he was motivated by Morgan's unique therapeutic technique to assure that couples' should try to remain as close to the original throughout their marriage.

The local newspaper also mentioned that Isabella López was on her way to Paraguay, where she would participate in the Miss Paraguay Beauty Pageant. At the same time, I was on my way back to Panama, playing with the idea of going to Asunción for the event. By sharing so many experiences, to me Issi was almost a granddaughter. Very few previous events have given me more pleasure than the moment I saw her being crowned Miss Paraguay.

The Gym's Inner Core and Jack Russell introduced me to the concept of "light sins."
